America Recycles Day Electronics Collection

The collection, available to all Cass County residents, was held in conjunction with the Louisville fall cleanup. The event was one of many across the country promoting America Recycles Day, a Keep America Beautiful initiative. America Recycles Day is celebrated annually across the nation on or near November 15 with a variety of recycling events and recycling education in the month of November.

American Recycling Company from Lincoln helped KCCB collect 181 various electronic items that filled a small truck. Thirty-eight people from the communities of Alvo, Louisville, Manley, Murdock, Murray and Plattsmouth took advantage of the collection. If you missed the event, look for other local recycling opportunities on our website at KeepCassCountyBeautiful.org. Thanks to all recyclers who participated and diverted electronics from the landfill. We hope to add more collections in other communities in the future.

County Household Hazardous Waste Results

The results have been tabulated for the three county HHW collections that took place on August 14 at Wiles Bros., Plattsmouth; the Cass County Fairgrounds, Weeping Water; and Midwest CO-OP in Eagle. A total of 161 households participated with the help of 30 volunteers assisting the trained team from Red Willow County. Here are totals collected: Paint - 6,640 pounds, Pesticides - 1,140 pounds, acids bases - 30 pounds, Oil - 270 gallons, Round-Up - 3.5 gallons, Anti-freeze - 25 gallons, Recyclables - 260 pounds, 2-4D - 20 gal., Florescent bulbs - 275, Batteries -15. **Total = 11,038 Pounds**

KCCB Joins Litter Hotline

With the help of DEQ and the Nebraska Department of Roads, KCCB has installed nine REPORT LITTERING signs across Cass County. The signs serve as a reminder to raise awareness about not littering.

When you see litter coming from a vehicle, write down the license plate number, description of vehicle, location, date and time of the occurrence. Then call the number at the left and report the littering information to Keep Nebraska Beautiful. KNB will forward the information to the Cass County Sheriff's office. A letter and litterbag will be sent to the offender stating the potential dangers and expense of litter along with a reminder that littering is a crime and carries a maximum fine of up to \$1,000.



KCCB Hosts NCEA Forum

Anne McCollister, co-founder of the Nebraska Community Energy Alliance (NCEA), provided a short informational meeting for the public on December 2 at the Louisville Senior Center.

Purpose of the forum was to explain how communities in Cass County could benefit from joining NCEA's statewide effort to build an electric vehicle charging network. The NCEA was organized in 2014 by nine municipalities as an inter-local cooperative agency to build and promote advanced technologies in transportation and housing that save energy, reduce CO2 and cut costs. NCEA has since grown to include 22 members, and its first project earned top honors in 2014 funding from the Nebraska Environmental Trust to demonstrate the economic and air quality benefits of electric and compressed natural gas vehicles.

Ms. McCollister also provided information about the NCEA organization, future plans, and opportunities for infrastructure funding for communities in Cass County.

KCCB Receives Grants for 2016

We are pleased to announce that Keep Cass County Beautiful will be awarded a \$37,887 grant for public education and a \$1,578 grant for litter cleanups from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality's Litter Reduction & Recycling Grants Program. This year DEQ changed the procedure for distributing funding. Organizations file a quarterly report and must have enough non-grant funds on hand to pay all expenses and then receive reimbursement for expenditures in the next quarter. The reimbursement process is slow and sometimes takes as long as 8 - 12 weeks to receive. So now more than ever, we really need your support with donations and memberships to help us continue to fund our many projects.

Keep Your Caps On and other tips

Did you know that you should recycle all plastic bottles with the caps on? According to the Association of Postconsumer Plastic Recyclers, the cap has more value than the rest of the bottle and caps are more likely to reach the recycler if they are kept on the container. Just rinse the container and don't flatten it because it could get caught in the sorting equipment.



Other tips: Can you recycle plastic bottles with pumps? Most recyclers will only recycle the bottle, but not the pump as some contain metals.

Are you recycling in the bathroom? Plastic bottles containing liquid soap, shampoo and conditioners, lotion, mouthwash, and baby powder can all be recycled as well as paperboard items: toilet paper tubes, bandage boxes, soap boxes, tissue boxes and empty aerosol cans. Not recyclable: dental floss containers, toothbrushes, toothpaste tubes and pumps. Go to our website "Recycling Info" tab for additional information.
